ISDP DIRECTORS' MESSAGE

DEAR FRIENDS AND COLLEAGUES,

In 2015, ISDP continued working towards its core mission of contributing to global peace, security, and stability, and expanding understanding of international affairs.

The Institute hosted a significant number of guest researchers, visiting scholars, and delegations, who contributed to ongoing policy debate both in Sweden and internationally with their knowledge and expertise. In addition, ISDP continued to conduct workshops and seminars, both in Stockholm and in the Institute's countries of research.

The Asia Program maintains a strong focus on China, Myanmar, and the Korean Peninsula. Due to increased funding from the European Union, the Myanmar Project in particular has grown considerably over the last year. ISDP has also increased its attention on Japan, which we hope to continue in 2016. Throughout the year, ISDP has implemented a range of activities within the Asia Program, which still functions as a network hub bridging the gap between academia and policy and providing timely information, analyses, and recommendations to the international policy community.

The Silk Road Studies Program maintains the core of its activities in the South Caucasus, the Black Sea Region, and Central Asia, with

Georgia, Turkey, and Kazakhstan being the main focus countries in 2015. The program closely observes and assesses local developments and their implications with the ambition of remaining at the forefront of analysis on international affairs. The program's articles have been published in leading analytical outlets in international affairs around the world, where they have been highly sought after and widely read.

The Transnational Threat Initiative continues to monitor organized crime in the Baltic Sea Region. In addition, the initiative implemented "No Green Drugs," a project funded by the Public Health Agency of Sweden examining the environmental consequences of drug production.

ISDP greatly appreciates its partnerships in Sweden and around the world and the support we have received in 2015. Our main goal for the next year is to further strengthen our expertise in our countries of research.

We look forward to expanding on existing co-operation with our partners, as well as starting new initiatives, receiving your comments about our work, and meeting you at our events and seminars in the coming year.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

ISDP operates through two principal and permanent programs: the Asia Program and the Silk Road Studies Program, which are the Institute's primary units. In addition, ISDP incorporates the cross-cutting Transnational Threat Initiative, which straddles the two programs.

Within the framework of these two principal programs, work at ISDP is organized in Initiatives and Projects. Initiatives have a long-term scope and focus on larger thematic areas and key countries that are central to the Institute's work, whereas Projects are established to deliver specific outputs with a deeper and narrower focus, within a short-term framework.

ISDP's work benefits from the Institute's exceptionally strong and unique network in its focus regions. These networks enable ISDP to conduct research and analysis at the forefront of its field, and to connect academia and decision-makers in the west with their regional counterparts.


The Asia Program conducts research into security and development challenges in the Asian region with a focus on the sub-regions of Northeast, Southeast, and South Asia. As such, it carries out policy-oriented and practical research, facilitates confidence-building exercises, and organizes conferences and seminars. The main objectives are not only to be a bridge between academia and policy but also to provide strategic insights and policy recommendations to decision-makers in governments, international institutions, and the private sector.

The Silk Road Studies Program runs a Joint Transatlantic Research and Policy Center with the Central-Asia Caucasus Institute at Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies, Washing-

ton D.C. The Program focuses on the western part of Eurasia, Central Asia, the Caucasus, Turkey, and Eastern Europe. The main activities and research are on state-building and political development, security and conflict, as well as the relationships between the regions and the West.

The Transnational Threat Initiative aims to raise public awareness and stimulate a debate on the negative societal effects of transnational organized crime. Transnational organized crime is regarded as one of the greatest global threats to human security and it undermines the development of open and democratic societies. ISDP has, over several years, built up a network of researchers and representatives of law enforcement agencies.

The Institute's main office is situated in Stockholm, Sweden. ISDP also has representatives in Ankara, Turkey; Chengdu, China; Copenhagen, Denmark; Tbilisi, Georgia; Washington D.C., USA; and in Yangon, Myanmar.

Since 2007, the Institute has worked towards its goal of providing independent analysis to policy makers and the analytical community on questions regarding security, conflict, and development. The Institute functions as a focal point for academic, policy, and public discussion of its focus areas through applied research, publications, research cooperation, public lectures, and seminars. ISDP strives to work closely with governments and independent organizations located in the regions of study and to pursue extensive collaborative projects, such as through exchanges of researchers and the organizing of joint conferences.

ISDP's work aims at providing strategic analysis and practical solutions to assist decision-makers

in both public and private sectors to achieve their goals. ISDP holds firm to the conviction that an understanding of international affairs requires a deep and comprehen-

INTERNATIONAL ASPIRATIONS

CHINA AS A RISING POWER

Understanding China, its domestic development and international role, is a prerequisite for any analysis of China as a rising power and its impact on developments in Asia and the world. The purpose of the China Initiative is to provide strong and independent analysis on developments in the country as well as utilize its exclusive in-country network to stimulate dialogue and exchange. The Initiative addresses issues in five major areas: foreign relations, military build-up, domestic developments, human security, and Sino-European dialogue. Sub-projects of the China Initiative include: China's Military Modernization, Cross-strait Relations, China's Foreign Relations, and China's Domestic Development.

Every year, ISDP holds a joint conference with the People's Liberation Army's think tank, the Academy of Military Science. The 8th annual conference held in Beijing in May 2015 was entitled "The Islamic State' and the Situation in the Middle East," which brought together noted experts from Europe and China to exchange insights.

The disorder in the Middle East and the rise of Islamic State (IS), which has seen it control large parts of Iraq and Syria, is a pressing security and humanitarian concern not only for the region but the international community as a whole. This year's conference sought to understand the emergence of IS within a broader context and to appraise the effectiveness of strategies to counter it.

Together with the Chinese Embassy in Sweden, ISDP furthermore organized the seminar "The Belt and Road Initiative - Opportunities for the next 65 years of China-Sweden Relations." The seminar marked the 65th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries, and brought together experts from China and Europe with the aim of exploring opportunities and challenges associated with the Belt and Road Initiative, as first proposed by President Xi Jinping in September 2013. In addition to these activities, the China Initiative has published analyses both within ISDP's own publications series, as well as in external outlets, received numerous delegations, conducted several research trips, and continuously worked to maintain and expand its wide and exclusive in-country network.

MYANMAR

PEACE EDUCATION

IN A DEVELOPING DEMOCRACY

Myanmar is an area of interest in international relations to both academic and policy circles. Recent developments in the country and the positive reactions by the international community allow for cautious optimism. Myanmar has in the fall of 2015 seen two pivotal moments in the signing of the nationwide ceasefire agreement and the general elections. However, many questions still beg for answers, and as a result, ISDP is intensifying its efforts in research and engagement with various stakeholders to assist the ongoing policy review process and whatever is to follow, all the while realizing that a lack of understanding has hindered policymaking toward Myanmar in the past.

ISDP has been involved in the analysis of Myanmar affairs for a decade. During this period, the Institute has developed a wide network of local contacts ranging across all states and regions in Myanmar, and from all levels of society. Thanks to funding from the European Union and the Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs, ISDP was in 2015 able to boost its local presence, and continue working towards its aim of social and political development in the country by supporting the peace and transition processes. This

ISDP's capacity-building workshops now engage more than 1.500 local actors.

can only be achieved by joint efforts involving all actors in Myanmar, and for this reason ISDP actively offers contextually appropriate training on key topic areas, and facilitation of related conversations to key actors; including research bodies, civil society, political parties and government.

Amongst other activities in 2015, ISDP continued its series of capacity-building workshops entitled "Peace Education Trainings." By implementing this method of "training the trainers," the program has been able to reach more than 1,500 individuals from civil society and political parties, within an 18 month period. Geographically, this program is implemented in 7 states and 3 regions and targets those af-

fected by conflict. They trainings aim to share knowledge and information on key aspects of the peace process, including the structure of Myanmar's peace process and on the upcoming national political dialogue.

Finally, the Myanmar Project continued to expand its Guest Researcher Program, which accepts between 2-6 researchers every year. The program is more thoroughly described on page 28.

The project aims to contribute to peace building in Myanmar in support of socioeconomic development and political reconciliation.

TURKEY

TOWARDS AUTHORITARIANISM?

ANALYSIS OF A COUNTRY IN TRANSITION

Geopolitical developments in the Middle East and the Black Sea region, Turkey's relations with the European Union, and the political evolution of Turkey - from being an experiment in democratic politics in a Muslim society to an increasingly authoritarian regime - all make Turkey a crucial country to both Europe and the United States, as well as to the region in which it is located. However, Turkey is generally treated peripherally within academic as well as bureaucratic institutions - on the edge of either Europe or Asia - but it is seldom taken as a focal point. The Turkey Initiative aims to fill a vacuum in this regard.

The Turkey Initiative of the Central Asia-Caucasus Institute & Silk Road Studies Joint Center was launched in 2006 and functions as a nexus for expertise, knowledge, and information on Turkish politics, society, and foreign relations. The main outlet of the Initiative is the Turkey Analyst, designed to provide authoritative analysis and news on the rapidly developing domestic and foreign policy issues in Turkey. It is published bi-weekly, and includes summaries of selected commentaries in the Turkish media. This section, named "What the columnists say" conveys a sense of the issues that are being debated, and of how they are being discussed by commentators in Turkey. This adds a complementary "local" color to the analytical articles predominantly authored by external analysts.

In 2015, ISDP's experts also engaged in a joint project with the Bipartisan Policy Center, with the purpose of investigating the background of Turkey's dramatic turn toward authoritarianism and Islamization in the past several years. The outcome of the project, the report entitled "Turkey Transformed: The Origins and Evolu-

tion of Authoritarianism and Islamization under the AKP," was published in November. See more details below.

THE CAUCASUS REGION

LINKING EAST AND WEST

RE-ENGAGING A CRUCIAL REGION

From a Western perspective, the Caucasus is far more important than its size alone would suggest. Its significance to the United States and Europe lies in its crucial geographical location, at the point of intersection between the key Eurasian powers of Russia, Iran and Turkey, and its central role in the burgeoning east-west transport corridor connecting Europe to Central Asia and beyond. The Caucasus is therefore key to any Western efforts to shape future interactions between Europe and the Middle East, and to Western commercial and strategic interests in Eurasia.

The project aims to support the region's Euro-Atlantic integration process by publishing timely analysis, implementing seminar activities, and working with capacity building with local actors.

The Joint Center publishes the Central Asia-Caucasus Analyst, a biweekly English web journal devoted to the analysis of the current issues facing the Central Asia-Caucasus region. For more than seventeen years, it has provided extensive coverage on the security situation in the Caucasus, as well as on the emergence

of continental transport and trade initiatives across the region. This year's Analyst saw contributions

from prominent analysts and commentators on topics such as Russia's Syria initiative, Islamic State, and relations with Europe.

ISDP has over the course of 2015 also issued in-depth research reports aimed at increasing awareness both in the region and in the West on issues relating to development processes in the South Caucasus. Notably, Svante Cornell, Mamuka Tsereteli and S. Frederick Starr published the paper "A Western Strategy for the South Caucasus," which has been highly influential in shaping the debate about the shortcomings of Western policy towards the region.

TRANSNATIONAL THREAT INITIATIVE

COUNTERING EMERGING THREATS

IN A CONNECTED WORLD

The threats that the world faces today are transnational in nature, and the traditional understanding of security has to be broadened and deepened in order to reflect this global change. As such, the current definition of security includes non-state and non-military threats, ranging from terrorism and environmental degradation to global epidemics and organized crime.

The Transnational Threat Initiative is ISDP's response to this evolving concept of security. Its mission is to conduct in-depth analysis of new security threats in close cooperation with academics, practitioners, and policy-makers in the field. The results of the Initiative are then disseminated to the public in reports, articles, and open seminars.

In 2015, the Transnational Threat Initiative continued working on the project No Green Drugs, aimed at highlighting the environmental consequences linked to drug production. The goal of the project is to research what is a relatively little known and understudied aspect of drug production and, in so doing, raise awareness among both law enforcement bodies as well as the general public. In particular, the project this year resulted in two main outcomes: an educational brochure targeting teenagers between the ages of 13 and 16, and a smartphone quiz app called Pugs Not Drugs. Both tools are meant to complement each other in the discussion of drugs at school and outside the classroom.

Separately, the Initiative also produced a report investigating cigarette smuggling from Latvia to Sweden, with the aim of providing a comprehensive overview of

the issue and associated policy recommendations for the Swedish National Association of Tobacco Professionals.

THE KOREAN PENINSULA

A LACK OF TRUST

international hotspots with North Korea's nuclear development posing a potential threat to regional security. With inter-Korean relations continuing to be marred by distrust and the breakdown of the Six Party Talks failing to resolve nuclear dilemma, efforts to enhance peace and stability are sorely needed. ISDP's research on the Korean Peninsula Issue focuses on examining regional security and analyzing confidence building measures regarding issues on the Korean Peninsula. Additionally, the project analyzes the prospects for a reunification on the Korean Peninsula by focusing on the differences in attitudes and perceptions between North and South Korea.

The Korean Peninsula remains one of the main

The Korea Project aims to contribute to peaceful development and reunification on the Peninsula.

In 2015, ISDP continued working to contributing to the confidence-building process between the two Koreas by conducting bilateral meetings with both countries, and with other parties concerned by the conflict, such as the United States, Japan, and China. By gaining a comprehensive view of all actors' stances, ISDP is able to thoroughly analyze the situation, as well as provide useful analyses and guidelines for Korean policy makers in dealing with the inter-Korean peace process

ISDP disseminates its findings in publications, public seminars and in a weekly newsletter summarizing recent events on the Peninsula. As an example, ISDP published an Asia Paper by Dr. Park Chang-

kwoun, formerly guest researcher at the Institute, focusing on outlining a roadmap to North Korea's denuclearization. This paper gave a domestic perspective to an issue which was previously covered by ISDP's own researchers, notably in the paper "Toward a Roadmap for Peace and Stability on the Korean Peninsula: Steps and Perspectives," which was published in 2014. Also noteworthy was the seminar "The Perils of North Korean Collapsism," during which Jong Kun Choi, Associate Professor of Politi-

cal Science & International Studies at Yonsei University, Seoul, problematized the narrative of awaiting North Korea's collapse, arguing that it would only aggravate Pyongyang's threat and justify its motives for continuing its nuclear program.

ISDP also continued im-

plementing its guest researcher program, with the aim of shortly re-instating the effort of simultaneously accepting researchers from both North and South Korea. In 2015, Woosuk Jung from the Ministry of Environment, South Korea, started a two-year stint as a visiting researcher. ISDP aims to also be able to accept a researcher from North Korea working on similar issues, with the aim of finding synergies for environmental cooperation between the two Koreas.

PUBLICATIONS

ISDP issues a wide range of publications from analytical and action-oriented policy briefs, published every two to three weeks, to its occasional paper series of Asia and Silk Road Papers that constitute more comprehensive studies. Other papers include the Focus Asia series, designed primarily for the Institute's visiting researchers to provide their perspective and analysis of the contemporary challenges facing their countries and regions. In addition, the Institute occasionally publishes longer books and monographs, typically edited volumes. Apart from in-house publications, the Institute's experts write op-eds, analyses, and commentaries in well-reputed newspapers and journals. The Institute's experts are also frequently invited to write chapters in external publications on topics of their expertise.

ARTICLES, COMMENTARIES & OP-EDS

ISDP's experts are frequently invited to contribute articles to various journals and to write commentaries and opinion-editorials, op-eds, in various newspapers. The articles and commentaries are usually longer, in-depth pieces on a current issue, while Op-Eds are generally a shorter contribution to an ongoing debate.

In 2015, ISDP analysts were active in the international debate on questions such as the implications of Turkey's shifting political climate, with analyses published in the Wall Street Journal, American Interest, and Foreign Affairs which were widely read. A further example of the work of ISDP's Turkey Initiative includes Halil Karaveli's analyses in publications such as the New York Times and Foreign Affairs. Among the latter, perhaps the leading analytical outlet in international affairs, several of Karaveli's analyses remained among the top five most read articles for several days.

The Asia Program contributed articles on the security situation on the Korean Peninsula, China's Belt and Road Initiative, and dispute management in the South China Sea, with articles by amongst others, Niklas Swanström, Sangsoo Lee, Bernt Berger and Ramses Amer published in outlets such as The Diplomat, East Asia Forum and Dragonnews.

These events aim to promote discussion and enhance knowledge and expertise on current security and development topics. Falling oil prices deeply affect oil-producing countries in Russia, Central Asia and the Caucasus. In addition, sanctions against Russia impact these countries directly or indirectly. Additionally, Russia's economic crisis reduced remittances sent home to Central Asia and the Caucasus by laborers working in Russia. Taken together, these factors create new economic and political dynamics in the region.

Torbjörn Becker, Director of the Stockholm Institute of Transition Economics (SITE) at the Stockholm School of Economics, discussed the issue during the ISDP Forum "The Falling Oil Prices - Implications for Russian Economy".

ACTIVITIES

In 2015, ISDP arranged and participated in numerous high-level delegation meetings, lectures and presentations; hosted roundtable discussions and undertook various research trips. All these activities are a part of ISDP's regular work and are undertaken under the different programs and initiatives. Below are a selection of activities in 2015.





VISITING DELEGATIONS

In 2015, ISDP received a high number of visiting delegations from established and new research partners. The China Institute for Contemporary International Relations, led by Professor Feng Zhongping, visited ISDP in May 2015, for discussions on Sino-European Relations and the security situation in East Asia. Furthermore, a delegation from the Academy of Military Science visited ISDP in November. During their visit, the delegation which was led by Sr. Col. Chang Wei, participated in discussions on China's Belt and Road Initiative and U.S. strategy in Asia. Additionally, **Toshiro Iijima**, Ambassador in charge of Policy Planning and International Security Policy from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan, (Pictured) held a presentation at a roundtable discussion focusing on Japan's role in global peace, stability, and security.

ISDP was honored to welcome Her Imperial Highness, Princess Ayako of Takamado, and a delegation of students from Josai International University in Togane, Japan.

Dr. Lars Vargö, ISDP Distinguished Fellow and former Swedish Ambassador to Japan and South Korea, gave a lecture on the Swedish Social Welfare System. The lecture was part of a four-day study tour for students to enable them to engage with local authorities and non-profit organizations dealing with social welfare issues and policies in Stockholm and Sweden.



PRESENTATIONS

ISDP's experts hold presentations around the world. This year, they visited countries such as Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands, the United States, China, Myanmar, Turkey and Iceland, to mention but a few.

ISDP Directors Svante Cornell and Niklas Swanström testified before the United States House of Representatives and the United States Congressional Commission respectively.

Dr. Swanström presented on "China's Security Engagement in Central Asia and the Question of Afghanistan" during the hearing "Looking West: China and Central Asia." He was joined by Head of ISDP's Advisory Council, Dr. S. Frederick Starr, who participated in the hearing as a speaker on the panel "China's Silk Road Policy." Dr. Cornell testified at a hearing of the Subcommittee for Europe, Eurasia, and Emerging Threats, at the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Foreign Affairs.

Furthermore, Walter Kegö of ISDP's Transnational Threat Initiative held several presentations during the year, notably at the Almedalen political week on the topic of the environmental impact of cannabis production.

ROUNDTABLES

ISDP arranged several roundtables during the course of the year. To name but a few, Bernt Berger led a delegation of European experts on Iran to Beijing for discussions about Iranian politics, the regional situation, and the nuclear deal. Furthermore, ISDP held several roundtables on topics such as European Politics and the Ukraine Crisis on the occasion of a visit from the China Institutes for Contemporary International Relations in May, 2015. Additionally, following the launch of the Silk Road Paper "Asserting Statehood: Kazakhstan's Role in International Organizations", ISDP arranged a dinner discussion, which was attended by policy makers, government representatives and diplomats.





FINANCIAL REVIEW

INCOME

The Institute has successfully diversified its operations, and consequently reduced the risk linked to a high dependency on the Institute's main funder, the Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The total revenue in 2015 was significantly higher than the previous year, amounting to 18, 2 MSEK. At the end of 2014, ISDP signed a two-year contract worth 2,000,000 EUR with the European Union starting in March 2015. This, together with continued funding from among others the Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs, the Swedish Board of Health and Telia Sonera, led to increased financial and organizational stability. Income from the Institute's main funder, the Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs, accounted in 2015 for 42 percent of total income.

INCOME STATEMENT



COSTS

During 2015, the main focus has been on continued cost control. Cost savings yielded from downsizing the Institute's office space in 2014 resulted in reduced rental costs with 37 percent, saving over 400 000 SEK.

However, in order to attain ISDP's goals and create long-term organizational stability, some investments were made during the year. A new website and new computers were deemed necessary in order to ensure high quality output and efficient dissemination of the Institute's work and activities.

The successful implementation of the new EU-project rendered an increase in terms of some costs. The newly opened office in Myanmar is mainly manned by consultants, which led to increased consultancy fees.

RESULT

The result in 2013 resulted in a negative equity. This was mainly due to a lower income than expected, combined with the time it takes to adapt cost structure to a new level of turnover. The same year, ISDP management drew up a plan to restore equity together with the Board. The positive result of 282 TSEK in 2015 is in line with that plan, which shows that the cost savings and efficiency measures taken place have had effect.

LOOKING AHEAD

The Institute's long-term budget and prognosis indicate that activities can carry on with continued good quality. The same prognosis estimates positive results in 2016 and 2017 as well as a restored equity in 2018. ISDP will continue to focus on diversifying funding and creating long-term, stable relationships with all stakeholders, as well as consistently aim to achieve high-quality outputs. Contracts with the European Union and Telia Sonera among others, will be ongoing in 2016.
